#### ANNUAL BUDGET VOTE AND BOARD OF EDUCATION MEMBER ELECTION

The Fabius-Pompey Central School District vote for the 2022-2023 budget and Board of Education member election will be held on Tuesday, May 17, 2022, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 9 p.m., prevailing time, by voting machine at the Fabius-Pompey Middle School-High School in the Town of Fabius, New York (for residents of the Towns of Fabius and Cuyler) and the Pompey Community Church in the Town of Pompey, New York (for residents of the Towns of Pompey, LaFayette and Cazenovia).

# FROM LLOYD L. PECK, ED.D. SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

It is hard to believe that the school year is coming to an end so quickly, with only two months left on the school calendar. It seems like only yesterday that students were arriving for the first day of school with heavy backpacks and a mask covering their smiling faces. It has been a very different but productive school year. Schools have effectively maneuvered a long year of COVID and COVID mandates, and are now mask-free and starting to get back to pre-COVID norms, with families and friends attending concerts, plays and sporting events without COVID restrictions.

Many events have taken place in the District over the past month. Middle School-High School students participated in *The Addams Family* musical, National Honor Society inductions, the start of spring sports, College Night, chorus and band concerts and ELA state testing in 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade. The Elementary School enjoyed the first ever Big Truck Career Fair, 3<sup>rd</sup> grade chorus concert and participated in the state ELA tests as well.

District-wide, the Fabius-Pompey Art Department participated in a kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade art show at the Fayetteville Free Library for the entire month of April.

As mentioned above, the District is moving back to pre-COVID status, but the effects of COVID will long be felt by all students and staff within the District. The toll on the mental health of our students is recognized by the District, and in an attempt to provide even more support to our student body, the District is adding an additional school psychologist to work with our student body. As a district, we realize that students need additional support in the current climate of COVID, social media and the ever-challenging world of just being a child. Hopefully, by adding an additional school psychologist, the District can further help our students to be successful both emotionally and in the classroom.

Lastly, it is time to vote on the school budget. One of the most challenging aspects of this position is to keep up with the needs of the District and students and still maintain a feasible operating budget with the lowest tax impact to our community. The District needs additional positions, such as the new school psychologist, but where do we find the money without impacting our students? Working very closely with the Board of Education and our Business Administrator, Dan Silky, the District was able to put together a very responsible budget, adding the resources we need and trimming in the areas that we did not. The budget is always challenging, but the District has a very educated and veteran Board of Education that recognizes the needs of both the students and the taxpayers, and they have approved a budget that allows for a minimum tax increase while still advancing education in the District. The vote is Tuesday, May 17.

# FABIUS MEMORIAL DAY PARADE Monday, May 30, 2022

The annual Fabius Memorial Day Parade will take place this year on Monday, May 30, at 10:30 a.m. As always, this day is to celebrate and honor those who have served and are serving our country. Lineup for the parade will be at the Fabius-Pompey Elementary School parking lot. The parade begins promptly at 10:30 a.m. There will be a short ceremony at the Evergreen Cemetery at 10:00 a.m., and the ceremony at the Monument (corner of Route 80 and Keeney Road) will begin after the parade (approximately 11:00 a.m).

**NEW PARADE ROUTE THIS YEAR:** The parade route will be different than in previous years. From the F-P Elementary School parking lot it will turn left (west) onto Main Street (Route 80), right (north) onto Route 91, right (east) on Academy Street, right (south) on Ridge Road and right (west) on Main Street (Route 80), ending back at the F-P Elementary School parking lot.

# FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Each year the budget development process starts in January and is ongoing through the spring until final adoption. It is a deliberative process, establishing a delicate balance between the District's financial requirements, including the many state mandates, and the District's needs and wants. When allocating resources, we look to improve educational opportunities while keeping pace in creating a setting for our students to remain competitive. It is not a requirement for us to offer the Honors and AP classes or the many extracurricular activities provided. We offer them to make sure our students are provided a well-rounded education and remain competitive.

Like many businesses, operations have changed for us as we have dealt and continue to deal with Covid-19. We made the decision to keep our buildings open for in-person learning. During the pandemic, we also offered remote learning for those not comfortable with coming to school. We have needed to create and fill positions to help students deal with the social, emotional and learning issues caused by Covid-19. We have had work-arounds with sports and other extracurricular activities. Not all ideal situations, but with the cooperation of the teachers, support staff, buildings and grounds personnel, bus drivers, parents and students, we all made it work.

Since 2012, one of the state mandates affecting school districts is the 2% tax cap. The tax cap is an ever-moving target calculated using a complex formula that is somewhat difficult to plan for or predict. Because of the way the tax cap is calculated, this year our tax cap is 2.93%. With a 12-month increase in the CPI of 8.9%, inflation is affecting all of us. In doing a detailed review of the budget during the last few months, we were able to adjust some budget line items. Even with some major line item increases, by paying off some capital debt we were able to bring the proposed 2022-2023 budget in at \$20,035,232. This is the same as last year's budget. As you all know, a budget has two sides, expense and revenue. Not to make things confusing, even though this year to next year budget is the same, since we paid off some debt we also lost the building aid that went with the debt. We lost aid revenue of \$462,000. The short explanation of what is going on is, on the expense side we have some significant increases in cost due to some needed positions that were filled and along with that we have to pay for the hit of inflation on all of our expense lines. We had adjustments to the revenue side with the loss of state aid and an increase of federally supported aid. With your support, our proposed calculated tax increase is 2.75%. That said, we are still under this year's state law allowable tax cap.

The budget is a spending plan that needs to be educationally sound while being fiscally responsible to the community. We need to engage sound fiscal school management practices for the strategic long-term financial welfare of the District. We use fund reserves to offset future expenses as we maintain a balance between revenue and expenses.

With all this said, what it really comes down to is that you are voting on our spending plan, the budget. The 2022–2023 budget is equal to last year's budget at \$20,035,232. Considering the current average inflation rate of nearly 9%, the Board has made the decision to use \$577,456 of our fund balance reserve to keep the levy in-check. By using this fund balance, the tax levy will have an increase of 2.75% with an estimated tax rate increase of approximately the same percentage.

The Board continually strives to maximize the efficiency of all working parts while maintaining excellence in our schools. Considering student needs and District obligations, while being respectful of our neighbors and their resources, Board members have thoroughly reviewed each of the 200-plus budget line items. Working together with the engagement of the community, administration and staff, we have approached the budget development process with creativity and efficiency. We have tried to maintain the balance between keeping our program cost down while remaining committed to being the best District we possibly can be.

We will always continue to look for ways to improve and are open to any ideas, budget or otherwise, that will benefit our children and our community. Thank you to our community members who have attended Board meetings during the past year, providing input for District programs and making budget recommendations.


