FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Every year the budget development process commences in January, extending until final adoption in spring. This thoughtful process aims to strike a delicate balance between the district's financial obligations, such as compliance with numerous state mandates, and meeting the needs and goals of the district. When allocating resources, our primary focus lies in enriching educational opportunities ensuring our students are prepared to compete effectively. Though not obligatory, the provision of Honors, AP classes, STEAM, and Pre-K programs, alongside various extracurricular activities, underscores our commitment to providing a comprehensive education program and fostering competitiveness among our students.

In our continuous efforts to enhance our students' experience and support their needs, we have implemented various initiatives over the past few years. Some of these initiatives are; establishment of a Pre-K program, increasing mental health staff, development of an Agriculture program and a STEAM initiative. With safety a concern, we have installed a number of safety measures and hired a school resource officer. We aim to further develop our Pre-K program contingent upon securing a grant. We also are actively working to align our curriculums across all grades to address lingering effects in math and reading from the pandemic.

Achieving and maintaining a balanced budget necessitates either increasing revenue or decreasing expenses, a fundamental principle familiar to us all. In our 2024-25 budget there are several key factors affecting our revenue stream. State funding stands as a vital revenue source for many school districts in New York State. However, to balance the State budget, the State is proposing to reduce aid to local districts including ours. State funding equates to about 50% of our revenue. This compels us to grapple with challenging decisions regarding budget priorities potentially leading to reductions in spending.

New York State's property tax cap requirement imposes restrictions on the annual increase in property taxes that school districts can impose. While this cap serves to control property tax increases for taxpayers, it presents challenges for school districts in generating sufficient revenue to meet their budgetary needs. With the tax cap restriction, it is tough enough to manage the budget under normal circumstances. It becomes particularly difficult as expenses continue to rise due to an increase in cost caused by inflation. In addition, to be respectful of our local residents we are trying to limit the increase in taxes on the district taxpayers.

On the other side of the equation, our expenses are significantly impacted by several factors. Considering the effects of inflation over the last couple of years, escalating costs of goods and services such as utilities, supplies and employee benefits place a strain on our budget. We have limited control over these costs while we aim to retain and attract qualified employees to educate our children. Despite a recent decrease in inflation, the prices of materials and supplies continue to outpace revenue streams. Service contracts signed before the inflationary spike are now expiring. Providers seek to recoup losses and cover their own inflationary cost by securing new contracts at a higher price. As an example, our electricity contract through our municipal cooperative was recently renewed at a price twice as high as three years ago during the last renewal. We anticipate this trend to persist, impacting operations at least until the 2025-2026 school year, and potentially longer if inflation remains stubbornly high.

Despite working through some of the worst impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, moving forward we continue to grapple with ongoing recovery efforts. These include addressing learning loss, providing mental health support for students, along with implementing needed safety measures. These endeavors require additional funding and resources further complicating budgeting decisions. State and federal funding that supported many of these measures during the last three years is now ending.

By establishing and building reserve saving accounts and not having used \$750,000 of the State Smart Schools Bond Technology Money allocated to us in 2015, we have diligently prepared for this situation over the past few years. We have devised a strategy to tackle the decline in revenue and the rise in expenses. It's important to note that approximately 80% of the costs for our Pre-K program, transportation, certain technology, and capital project expenses are covered by aid, leaving only an approximate 20% impact locally. Therefore, amidst escalating inflation affecting all aspects of our operations in addition to increases for employee contractual obligations, we need to implement spending reductions along with some attrition to

help balance the budget. We feel we can do this while still upholding the educational standards you expect and our students deserve. To alleviate the burden of imposed taxes, we will use some of these reserves and part of the smart bond technology money. This year, we are adhering to the allowable tax cap of 2.9%, representing an increase of \$270,305 over the previous year. Although not finalized at the time of writing this article, our total budget stands at approximately \$20.9 million, marking a 0.3% increase compared to previous years. It's worth noting that this challenge is not exclusive to the Fabius-Pompey school district but is prevalent among our neighboring districts as well.

The rising costs of education coupled with stagnant revenue streams present significant obstacles in maintaining the quality of our schools while providing for the diverse needs of our students. Navigating through these challenges requires a commitment to fiscal responsibility, innovative problem solving, and transparent communication with our community. Together, we will overcome these hurdles and ensure a promising future for our schools and our community. We hope to see you at the Tuesday, May 7, Budget Hearing, in the MS-HS Auditorium starting at 6:30 p.m.!

FROM LLOYD L. PECK, ED.D. SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Like many school districts, Fabius-Pompey is confronted with tough financial decisions. However, we remain committed to preserving the quality of education our students receive.

FABIUS-POMPEY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ACADEMIC PROGRAM

When the cornerstone for the building at 7800 Main Street was set in place in 1931, so too was the foundational belief that has guided the District in the years that have followed, "Enter to Learn, Leave to Serve."

This solid belief in learning, in order to prepare for productive citizenship, displays itself on a continuum from Pre-Kindergarten to Commencement. We aspire for academic excellence that prepares our students for a future full of possibilities.

The partnership between home and school continues to be an essential component to our success. Parents and families have helped to create this safe environment where working together to ensure our children's safety and growth are top priorities.

A caring community of staff, students, and parents consistently collaborate to enrich and extend available opportunities and resources.

A closer look inside the hallways and classrooms of the Elementary School reveals the following characteristics and components that contribute to our unique learning environment.

- A solid academic curriculum aligned with the New York State Learning Standards.
- A PreK-5 English Language Arts program based on reading, writing, informational text, literature, language and communication, research and study skills, and productive habits and attitudes, along with the distinction of continuous improvement on the ELA assessment.
- An environment where professionalism and teamwork are the norm, and teachers continually strive to expand their own knowledge and skills.
- A PreK-5 math program that is rooted in real-life problems and situations, and where students are engaged in investigation, data gathering and analysis, probability, geometry, patterns and algebra. Our students continue to demonstrate excellent understanding of concepts, problem solving strategies and reasoning skills.
- After-school enrichment clusters provide opportunities for children to explore their interests and involve children in activities such as sewing, games, and crafts.
- AIS (Academic Intervention Services) and RTI (Response to Intervention) support continues to provide our students with additional support and resources in reading and math.
- The Motor Lab is an exciting addition to our school that allows students the opportunity for additional movement and sensory input. Use of the motor lab stations addresses all areas of development through foundational and developmentally appropriate movements and skills. This includes activities like spinning, jumping, writing, crawling, rolling, bouncing, catching, balancing, cutting, eye-hand/eye-foot skills and even playing in a small ball pit. As students continue to develop and improve their balance, coordination, strength, ball skills, and sensory experiences they will be more prepared for the academic tasks of sitting at their desk, reading, writing, and problem solving for math.
- Our Winter and Spring concerts provide all students PreK-5th the opportunity to perform for their families and showcase their musical abilities during the school year. Band is offered to all students in 5th grade with a band concert held at the end of the year. Our 5th graders also participate in their first musical. This year, students will perform *The Lion King Jr.* Every student in 5th is provided the opportunity to be involved through singing, acting, staging and lighting tasks.
- We have implemented C.A.R.E.S. this year as our meaningful schoolwide behavior expectations program. Students have learned about these traits and what they look like and sound like in all areas of our school environment. We host assemblies for each trait to celebrate and recognize our students and all of their achievements. Our classroom teachers and school counselor collaborate to incorporate instruction around these expectations throughout the school year.
 Cooperation - Working together and helping others.

Assertiveness - Believing in and being able to stand up for yourself. Responsibility - Making good choices and taking accountability for your

actions. Empathy - Being able to know how someone else feels: "Walk in their shoes."

Self-Control - Your ability to manage your behavior.

The Elementary School is what a school should be - a place of learning and laughter where both children and adults continually strive to reach their full potential.


A professional adjudicator from the Theatre Association of New York
