FROM LLOYD L. PECK, ED.D. SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hello, F-P Families, Students, and Staff,

On Monday, December 5, the District hosted a virtual presentation on CTE and STEAM and what it means to become a STEAM district. The process for becoming actively involved in a STEAM program was discussed along with the criteria to be a STEAM district. The benefits of a STEAM program were discussed as well as the credits students would receive toward college and the internships that would be available to them under such a program.

A STEAM education is an approach to learning that uses Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics as access points for guiding student inquiry, dialogue and critical thinking. STEAM follows a career and technical education (CTE) program path that will provide academic and technical instruction in the content areas of Agriculture, Business and Marketing, Family and Consumer Sciences, Health Sciences, Trade and Technical Education and Technology Education. STEAM is an integrated approach to learning which requires an intentional connection between standards, assessments and lesson implementation.

A STEAM program would also offer our students the chance to do Registered Work-Based Learning as well as Unregistered Work-Based Learning and Supervised Clinical Experiences. A brief definition of those programs is as follows:

- Registered experiences typically take place outside of the school building, and students may earn academic credit in accordance with guidance from the work-based learning manual. There are three types of registered programs in New York: Career exploration internship program (CEIP), Cooperative career and technical education work experience program (Co-op), and General education work experience program (GEWEP). Registered experiences must be supervised by an appropriately certified work-based learning coordinator.
- Unregistered Work-Based Learning is unregistered experiences that may take place inside or outside of the school building. Students may not earn academic credit for these experiences.
- Supervised Clinical Experiences for Health Sciences are supervised clinical experiences that must be overseen by a New York State certified health sciences teacher in the specific health sciences content area in which students are completing a program.
 Students must be directly supervised by clinical instructors or the health sciences teacher of the program when in the field. Clinical instructors must hold appropriate New York State licensure in the health sciences career in which students are completing the clinical experience.

STEAM motivates teachers to utilize project-based learning that interconnects each of the five fields and encourages an inclusive learning environment in which all students are able to thrive. Breaking from traditional methods of teaching, teachers use the STEAM framework to bring disciplines together and enable students to use both sides of their brain at the same time. STEAM not only educates students how to think critically, solve problems and use creativity, it also prepares students to work in career areas that are predicted to experience significant growth by offering school-sponsored internships in the workplace.

This is a very brief overview of STEAM and what it entails. For more information, please feel free to reach out to me either by email or phone at jpeck@fabiuspompey.org or (315) 683-5301. As the District continues to evaluate the strengths of a STEAM program balanced with the implementation of the program, I will keep the public updated. Much of what we are already doing as a district can be converted into a STEAM program. This is a very exciting time in the educational world for the Fabius-Pompey Central School District as well as its students.

The Falcons Finish Their Fall Sports Season Strong -- On and Off the Field

The fall sports season finished strong in November, both on and off the field. Much of the success can be measured by records and championships. More importantly, success in the middle/high school setting can be measured by our student athletes' continued growth as young adults and how they continue to grow in the classroom. Success in sports usually correlates to success in the classroom.

The fall season on the field was highlighted by four championships:

- Girls' Varsity Soccer OHSL Patriot American League Champions
- Boys' Varsity Cross Country OHSL Patriot American League Champions
- Boys' Varsity Cross Country D-II Sectional Champions
- Boys' Varsity Soccer Class D sectional Champions

In the classroom, every varsity sports team earned the title of a scholar athlete team. In order to make this team, 75% of the team needs to earn above a 90% grade point average. Even more incredible is the fact that 42 out of 63 were scholar athletes with a 90% grade point average or better, and 57 out of 63 (90%) varsity athletes made the list as a honorable mention, honor roll or high honor roll student during the first marking period! In grades 7-12, we had 119 out of 133 (89%) of student athletes make the honor roll lists! Great Job, Fabius-Pompey Athletes!

Get Involved, Get Active and Get Educated!

The impact of sports on learning is often misconstrued as a negative impact on learning because of the time commitment. Often students decide not to participate because they "want to work on their grades." As it should be, education takes priority over sports. However, research shows that youth sports have an overall positive impact on students. Many studies have been conducted to take a deeper look into the positive impact sports may have on students.

Studies show that athletics help students engage in their work and become more focused. A study from VU University in the Netherlands showed how exercising can improve the attention span of school pupils. A report from the Pediatrics Journal portrayed how students who exercise after school can improve their executive control. Based on this research and other credible scientific studies, that children are much more capable to achieve in the classroom is supported by science. The University of Illinois found a strong relationship between the fitness of children and their performance academically.

Here are 10 ways high school sports benefit students – some of which students and parents may not even realize.

- 1. Lower dropout rate and better day-to-day attendance.
- 2. Higher grades. The Minnesota State High School League did a survey in 2007 which was reported by the NFHS. The survey found that the average GPA of a high school athlete was 2.84, while a student who was not involved in athletics had an average GPA of 2.68.
- 3. More likely to attend college. "Those who participate in high school sports are 15 PERCENT more likely to attend college. A 2007 study revealed that women who played sports in high school were 73 PERCENT more likely to earn a college degree within six years of graduating high school. This was even true for women from disadvantaged backgrounds."-At Your Own Risk website.

- 4. More confidence and self-respect. Sport is all about success, achievement, teamwork and friendly competition. Everything from small words of encouragement from the coach to scoring the winning goal for their team can help build your child's confidence. A sense of pride is built when representing your community.
- **5. Time management.** Athletes must learn time management skills if they are to get everything finished. This leads to less procrastination and a more focused work time.
- 6. Teamwork and leadership skills. More likely to climb the corporate ladder. Teamwork is a vital skill in the working world. Any successful team is made up of individuals who can work with others. Working well with others and decision making are important leadership skills.
- 7. **Stronger relationships.** Close friendships with teammates, ability to lead and be led, and a closer sense of family. Positive mentors can range from coaches to captains. All of these are essential for mental, emotional and physical health.
- **8. Less likely to get into trouble.** Those who participated in team sports are less likely to use drugs and smoke cigarettes.
- 9. Health. The CDC recommends one hour of physical activity every day. Those who do this are less likely to experience obesity, have a lower incidence of heart disease, stroke or even cancer and, consequently, face lower health care costs in their lifetimes. Reduced stress and improved sleep are other health areas improved.
- **10. Perseverance.** Learning how to fail is an important skill. By learning how to lose, you learn how to work harder and this helps you succeed in life. Success comes from practice and a never-give-up attitude.

Fabius-Pompey has about a 70-80% participation rate of athletes that play at least one sport. Much of the success is due to many factors such as teachers, administrators, parent support and involvement, culture and student dedication. Being able to have such a high participation rate in athletics, clubs and the arts all create a culture that breeds success. All together this fall, F-P had 76% of their students on the honor roll list after the first marking period. Of the students who did not compete this fall, 64% of them were also on the honor roll list. These are all great percentages when looking at the school body. It is hard to argue against the fact that sports have a positive impact on learning. There are ample opportunities at Fabius-Pompey to get involved, stay active and improve your student's well being.
