

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Agricultural Education News

Think agricultural education is just farming? It's not. It is hands-on education that is built on three concepts for success, both in the classroom, and outside. Agricultural education's three primary focuses include classroom/lab instruction, experiential learning (SAE), and leadership development (FFA). Classroom/lab instruction is a common sight in our agriculture classroom in classes, such as Agricultural Mechanics, Animal Science, Agriculture Power and Technology, and middle school agriculture.



Experiential learning in agriculture education allows students to further their education in order to develop career based skills. Finally, leadership development in agriculture benefits students in a variety of ways, such as building their capacity for self-knowledge and their understanding of how to create environments that allow others to be successful. Outside of the classroom, students can build these skills by becoming an active member of our FFA chapter.

The three letters in FFA stand for Future Farmers of America, but it isn't just for farmers; it's a national organization open to all Fabius-Pompey students in grades 6-12 interested in agriculture and leadership. Our FFA chapter participates in many events, such as LDE's (leadership development events), CDE's (career development events), attending Camp Oswegatchie in the winter and summer, visiting farms, and many more fun activities. FFA has many benefits, such as improving students' public speaking skills, enhancing career opportunities, building life skills, career exploration, and many more! Our District is off to a wonderful school year! The energy across our classrooms, fields, stages and hallways reflects the continuous enthusiasm and dedication of our students, teachers, staff and families. We are excited about all the great things happening throughout the District, from engaging academic and extracurricular opportunities to the progress being made on our ongoing capital project work.

The Board of Education is pleased to welcome two new student members this year! This initiative, now required across New York State, highlights the importance of including student voices in the conversations and decisions that shape our schools. Our student members bring valuable insight into the daily experiences, priorities and perspectives of their peers, helping the Board better understand the needs of the entire school community.

The initiative aims to cultivate leadership, responsibility, and civic participation among students by giving them valuable experience in public service, deliberation, and policy-making. These skills strengthen their sense of belonging and prepare them for active roles in their communities beyond high school. Although these student members do not have voting rights and may not attend closed executive sessions, they may participate fully in public discussions, provide input during meetings, and represent the interests and viewpoints of their peers, which introduces fresh perspectives and innovative ideas that reflect the evolving realities of school life.

We are beyond excited to have **Ava Lee** and **Ethan Ludke**'s voices at the table and look forward to the contributions they will make throughout the year. From the Superintendent

Fabius-Pompey entered the fall season with momentum, progress, and a shared commitment to providing every student with an exceptional educational experience. There is a great deal happening across the District, from new academic initiatives and facility upgrades to student accomplishments that continue to make us proud. Students are engaged, teachers are leading with creativity, and our entire school community is working together to make this year one of growth, innovation, and success.

At the heart of this momentum is the official rollout of our new Strategic Plan, which brings clear direction and purpose to our work across all grade levels. Developed collaboratively with staff, families, and community members, the plan focuses on three primary goals: **1. enhancing academic and enrichment opportunities; 2. vertically aligning academic subjects; and 3. improving communication throughout the District.** These goals ensure that every student experiences a consistent, engaging, and well-rounded education that supports growth, connection, and lifelong success.

To further strengthen communication and transparency, the District is now live streaming its monthly Board of Education meetings. This enhancement allows families and community members to view open sessions in real time and stay informed about the important decisions shaping our schools.

Our \$19.1 million capital improvement initiative, Project 2026, continues to move forward on schedule. This community-supported project is transforming our facilities to better serve current and future generations of students. Planning and design are well underway for the new Technology and Agriculture classrooms, auditorium lighting and sound upgrades, and athletic improvements. Each phase represents a significant investment in the learning environment, safety, and long-term vitality of our schools.

Student safety remains a top priority. This fall, we partnered with Onondaga County to install new stop-arm cameras on all District school buses. These cameras identify motorists who illegally pass stopped buses and are part of the countywide School Bus Safety Program. This initiative promotes awareness, accountability, and safer roadways for our students. We are grateful to our transportation team and county partners for their leadership in making this program possible.

The District's new bell-to-bell cell phone policy has also been implemented successfully in both buildings. Teachers report higher levels of focus, stronger classroom engagement, and more meaningful student interactions. Students are responding well, reconnecting with peers and learning activities without digital distractions. This initiative supports a positive, focused school culture, and we appreciate the ongoing support of families in reinforcing these expectations at home.

It has been an exciting and successful fall for Fabius-Pompey athletics. Our student-athletes have represented the Falcons with determination, teamwork, and sportsmanship, and we are proud of their achievements across all programs. Thank you to our coaches, families, and community members who consistently support our athletes and celebrate their success.

As we continue into the winter season, there is much to celebrate and even more to look forward to. The progress we are making reflects the dedication of our students, staff, families, and community partners. Together, we are building a stronger, more connected Fabius-Pompey, one that continues to thrive through shared purpose, pride, and commitment to excellence.

Health Screenings

School nurses conduct health screenings—for things such as vision, hearing, and scoliosis—to detect potential health issues that could impact a child's learning and development. These screenings are mandated by NYS law in specific grades and with new students. Results are sent to parents, for follow-up with a family doctor, if an abnormality is found. Screenings may also be done, at other times, if a school nurse deems it necessary, or if it's not documented on students' NYS physical form.

The purpose of early screenings are:

Early Detection—to identify health problems early, so they can be addressed promptly.

Academic Success—to prevent issues like vision or hearing problems from impacting a student's behavior and academic performance.

Preventing Long-Term Issues—to catch conditions like scoliosis early, which can prevent lifelong physical problems if treated.

Common screenings performed:

Vision—screening for distance acuity (how well a student can see far away), near vision acuity (how well they see up close), and color perception.

Hearing—screening for hearing acuity to detect problems that could affect learning.

Scoliosis—screening for curvature of the spine, typically for students in certain grade levels.

Water Quality Update

We recently tested the water at both schools, and the results show that the water is well within safe limits.

At the high school, sodium levels measured 44.9 mg/L and nitrate levels measured 4.75 mg/L. At the elementary school, sodium levels measured 89.5 mg/L and nitrate levels measured 2.48 mg/L.
