ESF Class Visits Newcomb Campus

The SUNY/ESF Global Environment class recently spent a weekend visiting the Newcomb ESF campus. The Newcomb campus includes the 15,000 acre Huntington Forest, which was given to the college in the 1930s, and has provided the backdrop for numerous research projects over the years. The site also includes Goodnow Mountain.

Planning for the trip began in September. We were informed that the dining hall and normal bunkhouses would not be available due to the NY State Ranger cadets who were staying at the Rich Lake cabins. This meant we would be cooking our own meals and staying in facilities at nearby Arbutus Lake.

Nine students (eight seniors and one junior) and three chaperones (Mr. Wilder, Mr. Sharpe and Ms. Reagan) left on Friday, November 18, a little after 8 a.m. and made our way to Old Forge, with driver Mr. Lysik piloting the bus. We picked up some last minute items at Mountainman Outdoor Supply Company, and ate some pizza at Tony Harpers, and then we were off to Newcomb. The area had received a few inches of snow and the long driveway into Arbutus was snow packed.



Dinner on Friday was spaghetti and sauce with meatballs and garlic bread. Each student brought in a food contribution for the meals. In this way we kept the costs way down, while enjoying home-cooked flavor.

That evening we had an orientation session with Jake O'Connell, the education coordinator for ESF Newcomb. We covered course material and had a lively discussion about shrews and their role in the north woods ecosystem.

Saturday we were up early and Mr. Sharpe prepared a hearty breakfast of bacon, eggs and toast. We also made sandwiches for later in the day. Jake brought microspikes for the climb up Goodnow Mountain. Goodnow trail is about 2 miles in each direction, with a vertical rise of about 1000 feet. The students, accompanied by Jake and Ms. Reagan, climbed it in less than an hour, with Mr. Sharpe and Mr. Wilder following.

We all ate lunch and started our service project. The college allows us to reduce the costs of staying by doing a couple of hours assisting with some small chores. In this case, we loaded pieces of furniture onto a trailer from a place near the Upper Works that used to be owned by ESF. The furniture was then placed in various buildings back at the Newcomb facilities.

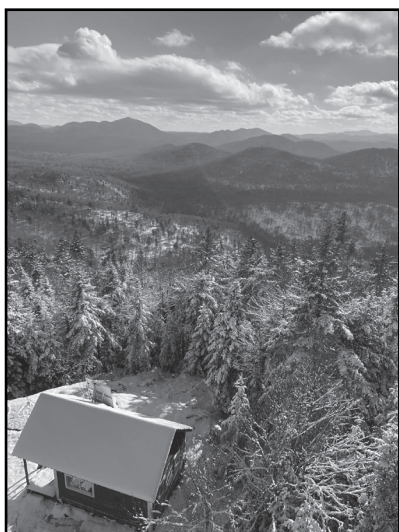
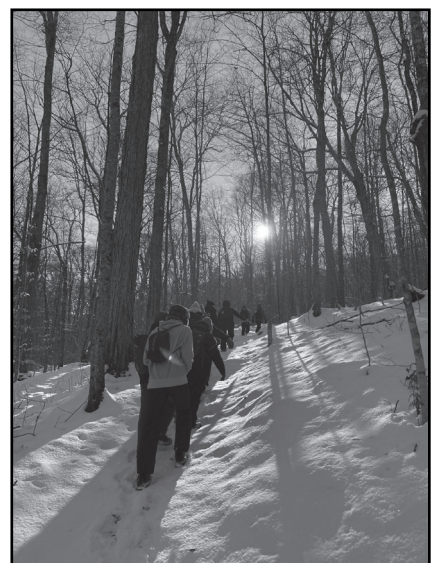
The Upper Works was the site of an active iron foundry in the 1800s. It utilized the Hudson River as a source of power for the blast furnace as well as for transportation of the iron to locations downstate.

We returned to Arbutus and enjoyed a dinner of pulled pork with a side of chicken wing dip made by Ms. Hopseker. Ms. Reagan brought homemade soup and we had brownies made by Mrs. Wilson. That evening there was a campfire with s'mores and Jiffy Pop.

The next morning, we cleaned the cabins and lodge and loaded up gear in the bus. We headed over to the nearby Adirondack Interpretive Center, where Jake gave an in-depth history of Huntington Forest. Asher Huntington and his wife, renowned artist Anna Hyatt, left the entire 15,000 acres, along with all of the buildings, to ESF in the 1930s when they moved south to the Carolinas.

We had a final brainstorming session on the projects that students are starting for the class. The projects typically take about half a year to complete. Jake has offered to assist students with the projects as the year progresses, and he has invited our group for a follow-up visit in the spring.

A shout out to Mr. Lysik, who kept us safe through a tenacious band of lake effect between Old Forge and Rome. We arrived home about 5 p.m., and after the students cleaned the bus and distributed any uneaten food, we were all headed back to our homes. The trip was an outstanding success!

FROM DANIEL S. SILKY BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR

Having turned the 2022 calendar to 2023, it's time to begin thinking about the school budget season. As I prepared to write an article about our budget process, in my mind, I kept coming back to the article I wrote this time last year. As I re-read the article (for inspiration), I realized...why re-invent the wheel! Here it is again, for your reading pleasure:

Routines. Like most of you, I love being in my routine...whether that is at work or home. It helps me feel productive and allows for a sense of accomplishment when I can "check off" something on my list. One of the many challenges caused by the pandemic is that it threw me out of my routines. I am sure many of you can relate...

The budget season is a very important routine in the district's business office. This can feel overwhelming and not straightforward to many among the community. Indeed, it is! A \$20M annual operating budget has many moving parts! Yet, every year we must prepare a budget – even while dealing with a pandemic. I have made an attempt to simplify and summarize the steps to preparing the school budget below. While there are many steps and this just scrapes the surface of what each involves, these steps do lend themselves to a routine...which I love!

1. Set Budget Calendar and Budget Procedures – this ideally happens in October of the current year. For example, in the fall of 2021, F-P approved the budget calendar to prepare the 2022-23 school year budget. It gives structure to the budget development process and holds those involved accountable. This might seem early, but you will notice below why it must be approved in the fall.
2. Complete BOCES Initial Service Request – by mid-December, BOCES needs an initial sense of what services each district will be purchasing for the following year. Discussions within the district should begin as soon as November to determine services needed, whether services should be increased or decreased, and whether services are no longer needed. BOCES needs this information across all the districts because BOCES is a shared services organization and the participation of districts drives the cost of the service. BOCES approves its budget in April, which is needed by the districts so they know the cost of their BOCES services.
3. During January, the state releases projected aid amounts that it will provide to each district. These aid amounts are not final until the state adopts its state budget by April 1.
4. During February, the tax cap is calculated. This cap is used to determine by how much a district can increase its tax levy with a simple majority vote. This impacts your school tax bill that you receive in September.
5. During March, the administrators and department heads work together to determine what supplies and contractual services are needed.
6. By the end of April, the budget must be finalized so the district can prepare its Property Tax Report Card. This card details the three parts of the budget along with whether or not reserves will be used to support the budget.
7. Budget Newsletter and Hearing – the Budget Newsletter is the district's opportunity to present the budget in a form – three-parts – required by law. This format is meant to clearly communicate how much will be spent on instruction, administration and capital costs. At the hearing, which must take place seven to fourteen days before the vote, the budget is presented to attendees to further explain its three parts.
8. Voting Day – the third Tuesday is the statewide budget vote day.

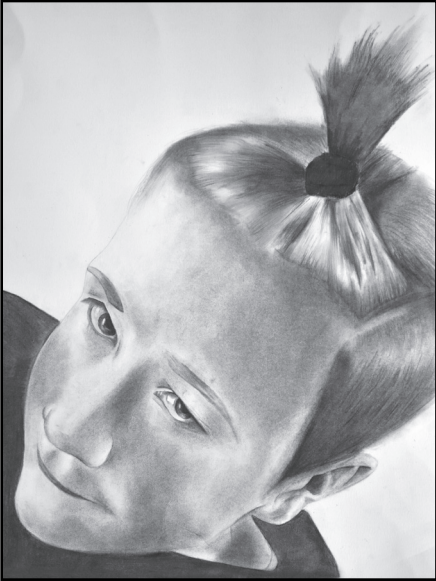

This year there were about 4,200 entries from students in grades 7 through 12. Out of those 4,200, 200 receive Gold Keys, 400 receive Silver Keys and 400 receive Honorable Mentions. Students’ artwork will be part of the CNY Scholastic Art Awards Exhibit at Onondaga Community College in the Whitney Building through March 3.



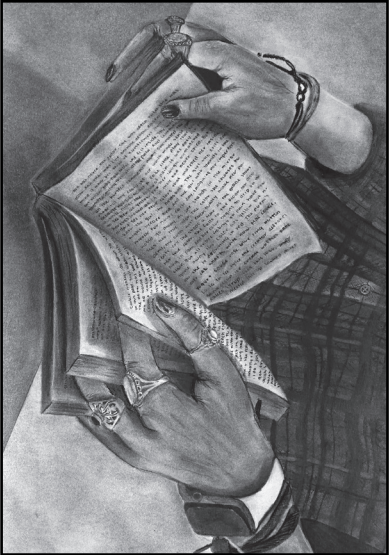

Remember to check **all of the college websites, for required forms and deadlines.**

There are **three basic financial aid forms:**

- **FAFSA (free).** This is the application for federal aid. (www.fafsa.ed.gov)
- **TAP (free).** This is the application for NY state aid. (www.hesc.ny.gov)
- **PROFILE (fee).** This form is used only by certain colleges, and has a fee attached. Submit only to those that require it! (<https://cssprofile.collegeboard.org>)

College bound seniors should have completed their FAFSA, TAP and any other financial forms by this time.

Families who have not filed should do so soon, in order to be considered for all available financial aid programs.

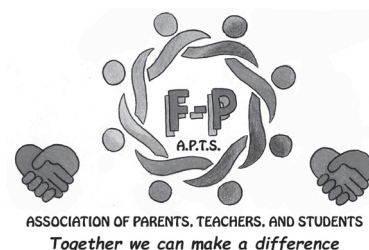
